






#### **CHAPTER 1.1**

# HELP US TAKE CARE OF BERGEN AND THE REGION

Help us take care of Bergen and the region. We who live in Bergen love our city – and we love our visitors. We believe that a good city to live in, is also a good city to visit. That is why we encourage everyone who visits Bergen and the region to help us take care of our nature, the world heritage, our neighborhoods, and the local communities during your visit. Here are seven guidelines we hope you will follow.

#### 1 Show consideration for others

Show consideration for both the locals and other visitors. Be respectful towards the people working in shops, museums, restaurants and attractions. Bus stops and the railway station are no-smoking areas. If you visit mountains or fjords, remember that the silence in nature is part of the experience. It is customary to greet the people we meet along the walking paths in Norway.

#### 2 Use waste bins and public toilets

Please do not leave behind any waste in the city or in the nature. Use the public waste bins or bring the waste with you until you can correctly dispose of it.

We do not appreciate people relieving themselves in the city parks, this is illegal and can be heavily fined. There are many public toilets scattered throughout the city, use these instead.

#### 3 Respect private property

Remember that the many beautiful houses you see in Bergen and the region are the homes of locals, and therefore private property. Please be considerate towards the people who live and work in the city and respect their right to privacy. Do not enter private gardens or take pictures through windows into people's houses. The World Heritage site Bryggen is also private property. Please be extra mindful to preserve it. Smoking is not permitted in the Bryggen area.

## 4 Take care of the nature and wildlife. Respect the weather

Nature is beautiful but can be unpredictable. The weather can change quickly in western Norway. Stick to the marked paths while hiking. Show consideration to the wildlife, particularly in the spring season. Always walk your dog on a leash. This is mandatory year-round in Bergen and the surrounding mountains. If you are not used to walking in untamed nature, we recommend using a local guide. Ask the Tourist Information for advice. See our guide on page 22 for more practical tips for hiking in Bergen and the region.

#### 5. Consider the timing when visiting the most popular spots. Make sure to explore the whole city and the region surrounding Bergen

During winter there is plenty of space in Bergen. Some days during the summer however, it can become crowded in areas like Bryggen, the Fish market and Fløyen. Consider the timing of your visit to the most popular attractions. It is a good idea to Visit Fløyen in the evening and enjoy the sunset from the top. You can also enjoy the sight of Bryggen from the other side of the Harbor (Strandkaien) during the busiest hours. This is also the best photo spot. By avoiding these areas during the busiest hours, you contribute to lowering issues of overcrowding, and at the same time you will have a better experience as a visitor. Remember that Bergen is more than the city centre. The region around Bergen is packed with beautiful areas, a variety of hiking opportunities, plenty of waterfalls and a rich cultural heritage. Make the most of your trip by exploring the whole region. When in Bergen, be sure to also explore the many different neighborhoods like Sandviken, Nordnes, Møhlenpris and Nygårdshøyden.

# 6. Minimize your footprint by making more sustainable choices


Bergen is labelled as a Sustainable destination. Help us remain this quality mark by making sustainable choices during your visit.

Opt for eco-labelled hotels, activities, and restaurants. Travel on public or low emission transportation. Bring your own water bottle and refill it for free from the many fountains throughout the city. Try the local food scene and learn more about our history and culture. You can find more tips to make your journey more sustainable on page 16.

#### 7 Photography and drones

You can take pictures almost anywhere in Bergen. Some places – mainly in art galleries and museums – may have signs indicating that taking pictures is not allowed. Always remember to ask people around you whether you may take a picture of them. Taking pictures of children in schools and kindergartens is not allowed. Special rules apply to the use of drones. Usually, it's not allowed to use drones in populated areas (like the city center) or in national parks. Learn about the rules before takeoff. You can read about them on the Civil Aviation Authority of Norway's website

# The practical and reasonable way to explore Bergen, City of Culture.

With the Bergen Card in your pocket, you travel free on the Bergen Light Rail and buses in the city and the region. You also get free or discounted admission to museums and attractions, various sightseeing tours, restaurants and parking. The Bergen Card gives you admission to attractions in the city centre as well as other attractions in the region.

Bergen has many museums, some with unique art collections and others that show the breadth of the city's historical heritage. Take a trip up to Mount Fløyen and enjoy the view of the city, the fjord and the ocean. See seals, penguins, crocodiles and snakes at close range at Bergen Aquarium, or explore the world of science and technology with your family at the VilVite Science Centre.



The Bergen Card is personal. Always take it with you and show it without being asked. It is checked at places that take the Bergen Card. See what you save by using the Bergen Card when visiting the city's many attractions and sights.

Travel destinations play a key role in the progress towards more sustainable tourism. We are very proud that Bergen is the largest destination in Norway to be labelled as Sustainable Destination. Sustainable Destination is a Norwegian labelling scheme and quality mark, that ensures that destinations work systematically to become more sustainable over time, in areas such as lowering climate gas emissions, strengthening local communities, protecting natural areas and the cultural heritage, and creating a more positive economic impact from tourism.

Sustainability however cannot be achieved without the help of our visitors. We have therefore gathered a few tips we hope you will follow to make your travel in Bergen a bit more sustainable. Join us on a journey to make Bergen an even better place to live and to visit for future generations to come!

#### 1. Choose low emission transportation

Transportation is the biggest source of emission from travelling. Bergen is a world leader in green transportation, making it easy to choose low emission modes of transport.

Bergen has a compact city centre, and most attractions in the city can be reached within a 15-minute **walk**.

If you want to explore the city by **bike** you can rent one of our many city bikes, called "Bysykkel", scattered across the city. These are available all year round (in the winter the wheels are equipped with spikes). Outside the city center you can take

advantage of a well-developed **public transportation** with a variety of low-emission buses (electric or biofuel powered) or the Bergen Light Rail. With the Bergen card you get free admission on all public transport in the whole of the Bergen region.

From Bergen there are many daily **trains** departing to Voss, Flåm and Oslo along the Bergen Railway. The railway has run on renewable energy since 1964! The train ride from Bergen to Oslo is considered one of the most scenic and beautiful train rides in the world and takes about seven hours. There are also many **regional buses** departing daily from Bergen to most cities and towns along Western Norway and in Southern Norway.

The rugged terrain of western Norway can make it difficult to explore some parts of the region exclusively by using public transport. Many people therefore choose to rent a car to explore the region. If you consider renting a car, we recommend that you choose an electric car. Bergen has the highest concentration of electric cars per capita in the world, and the availability of charging stations is very good throughout the region surrounding Bergen. This way you can explore the region with a clean conscience.

## 2. Stay a day or two longer in the Bergen region

Did you know that staying for a longer period at your chosen destination is one of the most important things you can do to lower your environmental footprint Look for The Green Travel symbol in the Bergen Guide to find ecolabel tourism enterprises in the region.

from travelling? When guests choose to stay longer, the demand for new guests arriving declines and with it the emissions related to transportation. At the same time the value creation and number of jobs at the destination can be upheld. And by staying longer in Bergen you also get more time to really explore the city and region!

#### 3. Choose eco-labelled travel suppliers

Look for an eco-label when choosing an activity, a place to eat or a place to sleep. When choosing an eco-labelled travel supplier, you can be sure that the company has committed itself to work systematically with sustainability. Holding an eco-label does not mean that the business is completely sustainable, but it tells you that they fulfil several criterions aimed at reducing their footprints and that they are working continuously to become more sustainable and environmentally friendly over time.

In this guide or at VisitBergen.com you can look for the symbol "Green Travel" to find an eco-labelled travel supplier in Bergen. The purpose of the symbol is to make it easier for our guests to find a certified supplier.

The following certification schemes is included in the Green travel symbol: Ecotourism Norway, Nordic Swan Ecolabel, Eco-Lighthouse, Green Key, ISO 14001 and Blue Flag.

#### 4. Eat like the locals!

Bergen is a city with proud seafood traditions, with specialty dishes like the Bergen fish soup and Persetorsk (cod prepared in a special way), which is a must to try! Along with fresh fish and other produce, the Bergen region also offers award winning local products like Myrdal cheese, Bareksten gin and Hardanger cider. When you buy locally produced food you contribute to the preservation of local food traditions and jobs. Locally produced food also requires less transportation and therefore produce less emissions on its way to your dinner plate. And did you know that many restaurants in Bergen are part of an initiative where greens and vegetables are grown on roofs throughout the city?

## 5. Learn about the local culture and history

Bergen is one of the oldest and largest cities in Norway, and with this comes a great cultural heritage. By visiting one of the many museums in the Bergen region you contribute to the preservation of the local culture, traditions, and history.

Apart from the UNESCO World heritage site Bryggen and The UNESCO Biosphere area of Nordhordland, the Bergen region is rich in history from the Medieval period and World War 2, has a unique textile history and industry, a university which holds its own botanical gardens and much more.

# 6. Explore the fjords on an electrical fjord cruise

Did you know that Western Norway probably has the highest density of electric ships and boats in the world? As a visitor you can experience this on the electric voyage going between Flåm and Gudvangen on board The Fjords different sightseeing boats. Norway in a nutshell® is a popular roundtrip combining the boat trip with the Flåm Railway.

# 7. Choose from a variety of activities and experiences with a low footprint

Bergen offers a great selection of experiences that have a low environmental footprint. The Fløibanen funicular and Ulriken cable car takes you up to the greatest views of Bergen. They are both almost exclusively powered by the

counterweight of the second carriage riding down the mountain, pulling the other up.

If you want to experience Bergen by the seaside you can rent kayaks for free from Green Kayak, at the Norwegian Fisheries Museum. In exchange you have to pick up the trash you might find in the harbour basin.

Bergen is surrounded by seven mountains, and there is a myriad of different hiking trails only a short distance away from the city centre. If you are less experienced as a hiker or want to learn more about the region while hiking, a guided hike is a great and always recommended alternative. Please be considerate towards the nature, wildlife, and people while hiking, look for our practical tips for hiking in Norway at page 22 in this guide.

#### 10 PRACTICAL TIPS WHEN HIKING IN THE BERGEN REGION

The stunning Norwegian nature is for many one of the reasons to visit Norway. In the Bergen region you will find a wide variety of hiking opportunities. But how can you enjoy the nature in a safe and responsible way? Here we have gathered some of our best practical tips for hiking in Bergen.

#### 1. Proper clothing is key

To have a good hiking experience, the right clothing is crucial. The weather in Bergen and Western Norway can change quickly. We therefore recommend that you always pack warm clothes and a shell jacket in your backpack as a minimum. Choose footwear according to the conditions, even if the weather is dry, there might be wet areas on the trail.

#### 2. Getting hot and want to cool down?

Taking a dip while hiking can be surprisingly refreshing! It's allowed to take a swim in lakes or in the sea but note that it is not allowed to swim in drinking water sources or in certain conservation areas. This applies for example to large parts of the mountains surrounding Bergen.

#### 3. Feel free to camp, but avoid some areas

It's perfectly legal to sleep in a tent or hammock in the Norwegian nature. But the camp site must be at least 150 meters from the nearest house, and it's not allowed to camp on cultivated areas, for instance in parks, graveyards or areas used for farming. You can maximum stay for two days in the same spot. Avoid setting up camp in or near drinking water

PS: remember that sound carries well in nature and that there may be others sleeping outside in the same area. Turn down the volume of any portable speakers.

#### 4. Picture that!

It's allowed to take pictures of almost everything in Norway, but if you want to take pictures of people you should first ask for their consent. There are special rules for the use of drones. For example, drones are not allowed in national parks or near airports. Read more about which rules that applies on The Civil Aviation Autoritity's website: luftfartstilsynet.no/en/

Remember that others may be inspired by the photos you post on social media. Please avoid posting or spreading photos or directions to motives that might be difficult or dangerous for inexperienced hikers to reach.

#### 5. Let there be light

There are huge seasonal varieties in when the sun sets. During summer it can be bright for large parts of the day, but it gets dark quickly in the winter. Before setting out on a hike, you may want to check at what time the sun will set that day. Check the weather forecast and plan to be back from the trip well before it gets dark. Bring a headlight in your backpack for safety.

#### 6. Can I light a fire?

Lighting a bonfire can be a magical experience, but remember that there is a general ban on bonfires between 15th of April and 15th of September. The ban also applies for disposable grills, firepans, and other sources to open flames. Trust us when we say that you don't want to be responsible for causing a wildfire.

If you want to make a fire between 15 September and 15 April, do not do any damage to healthy trees while collecting wood and remember to put out the fire completely before leaving the area.

#### 7. When nature calls

If you are going on a hike that lasts a few hours. you may want to be prepared to go to the toilet outdoors. Pack with you what you need when nature calls. Remember that others are likely to follow your trail, so pull well away from the path and bring your toilet paper or sanitary products home with you in a plastic bag. Dig a small hole in the ground to hide

#### 8. Don't leave any traces and respect the wildlife

Everything you take with you on your trip must also be taken home. Leave the nature in the same condition as when you arrived. Pack a bag you can collect your trash in. Feel free to pick up any other rubbish you come across on your trip. Show consideration to the wildlife, particularly in spring when new life is abundant in the animal kingdom. Always keep your distance when encountering wild animals. Remember that it is illegal to remove eggs from their nests. Always walk your dog on a leash. This is mandatory year-round in Bergen and in the city mountains.

#### 9. Follow The Norwegian Mountain Code "Fjellvettreglene"

Planning to do a longer hike you are not familiar with? The mountains can be unpredictable and without cell phone coverage. Use a guide or follow the nine simple rules of the Norwegian Mountain Code to minimize your own risk:

- 1. Plan your trip and inform others about the route vou have selected.
- 2. Adapt the planned routes according to ability and conditions.
- 3. Pay attention to the weather and the avalanche
- 4. Be prepared for bad weather and frost, even on
- 5. Bring the necessary equipment so you can help yourself and others.
- 6. Choose safe routes. Recognize avalanche terrain and unsafe ice.
- 7. Use a map and a compass. Always know where
- vou are.
- Don't be ashamed to turn around.'
- 9. Conserve your energy and seek shelter if necessary.

Note: If it rains heavily and fog covers the mountain tops, you might not want to embark on challenging hikes like Vidden or Trolltunga.

#### 10. Hei og god tur!

Forget everything you have been taught about the introvert Nordics. While hiking in the nature, it is common to greet people along the trails. Say "Hei"! And don't be afraid to ask fellow hikers about the condition on the trail ahead. Wish them "God tur" after the chat.

Thank you for being prepared. Lower your heart rate and enjoy the nature!

# AUSTEVOLL ARCHIPELAGO OF 667 ISLANDS AND ISLETS

#### NATURE EXPERIENCES ARNUM IN AUSTEVOLL

The Austevoll archipelago is situated between Bergen and Stord, and its biggest villages are Storebø and Bekkjarvik.

You can take the boat from Strandkaiterminalen in the centre of Bergen to Bekkjarvik. There is also a ferry from Krokeide to Hufthamar for those taking their own car.

If you plan to see Bekkjarvik, you should definitely take the opportunity to visit **Bekkjarvik Gjestgiveri**, which is in an idyllic setting beside the harbour. This guest house, which was built at the end of the 17th century, is family-run and still provides accommodation. When visiting Austevoll, make sure you visit Restaurant Mirabelle by Ørjan Johannessen. Previous winner of Bocuse d'Or, Ørjan Johannessen creates high-quality culinary experiences together with his brother Arnt.

From Bekkjarvik, you can also go out fishing at the **ocean's edge**, for a day

of fishing, sea spray in your face and fisherman's yarns. On the local boat MS Tjelden, you can go island hopping between the islands of Austevoll (operated by Norled). You can either stay on the boat and enjoy a round trip, or hop off en route and take another boat to your next destination.

Austevoll is a cycling paradise now that the biggest islands have been linked together by bridges. Good, quiet roads and great scenery make for fantastic cycling. You can rent a bike if you don't bring your own. You can also hire a SUP (stand up paddle board) and kayak in Bekkjarvik.

Animals and people have created a beautiful landscape of colourful heathlands and charming drystone walls as protection against the elements. Nordhordland north of Bergen is a gem for nature experiences, exciting emigration history and activities that are guaranteed to bring a glow to your cheeks, the wind in your hair and laughter and joy.

#### Fjord just outside Bergen

The sea route is the most beautiful way to reach Nordhordland. Every day, all year, you can take a sightseeing boat up the beautiful fjord landscape of Nordhordland. The nature experiences start as soon as you board the boat, as you pass Nordhordland Bridge, Alverstraumen and the island of **Osterøy**. Innermost in the Osterfjord, the boat takes you up the narrow Mostraumen strait with its strong currents to **Modalen**. This trip is a perfect

fjord experience, with sheer mountains and waterfalls, idyllic farms and small villages, fauna and fresh sea air.

## The lifesaver that shaped the land and people

Traces of the first people who settled along the coast can be found at, among other places, **Fosenstraumen** and at **Skipshelleren**. People started farming sheep around 4,500 years ago. Sheep are superbly adapted to the harsh climate, with their 'raincoat' over a warm layer of wool. **Ullruta** – the wool route tells the story of how sheep became a lifesaver for people living along the coast.

At the **Heathland Centre at Lygra**, you can learn about how farmers cultivated the heathlands as grazing for their animals. **Osterøy Museum** tells the story of how the Vikings invented the first raincoat, the



Lyngheisenteret

'Varafell'. You can also learn about how wool was used in the mass production of clothes at the **Textile Industry Museum.** At the **Western Norway Emigration Centre at Sletta**, you can hear about Norwegians who brought wool with them to the prairie when they emigrated to America.

Today, new generations are discovering this strong and sustainable natural product, and enjoying learning old craft techniques and patterns. The well-known brands, Hillesvåg Ullvarefabrikk, Dale of Norway, Oleana and Norlender, which still use wool in their first-class, Norwegian design products, are based in Nordhordland.

Walks in the beautiful Stølsheimen mountains in Masfjorden, between the Sognefjord and the Vossefjellene mountains, offer great natural and historical experiences. In Matre, you will find the Bjørn West Museum where you can learn more about the dramatic fighting that took place in the Stølsheimen mountains towards the end of World War II.

The area has varied and majestic scenery, with waterfalls and spectacular walks from the fjord to the mountains. **Stordalen Fjellstove** is a good starting point for walks, and also offers guided walks, accommodation and good food.

#### Fedje - the village in the sea

Fedje is an island at the ocean's edge with a population of just over 500. You can stay at **Hellisøy lighthouse**, and enjoy its panoramic views. Visit the Tourist Information at the quaint shop on the quay. After a lovely walk in the coastal heather, you can enjoy a delicious meal at one of the island's restaurants. It also has a swimming pool. The easiest way to get to Fedje is to take the ferry from **Sævrøy** in Austrheim.

### Gulatinget – the Vikings' parliament and court

Western Norway has played an important role in history – all the way back to the Viking Age. King Harald Fairhair (reign approx. 872–931) founded the **Gulating** in **Gulen**. It was one of the oldest and biggest legislative assemblies in the Nordic countries, and 'Gulatingsloven' was one of the earliest laws. Vikings from all over

Western Norway gathered here every year to meet the king, discuss political issues, adopt laws and pass judgment in cases.

An Anglican cross and a Celtic cross dating from the 11th century still stand in Eivindvik. They mark what is believed to be the original site of the Gulating. At the **Gulatinget Millennium Site** in Flolid, the other site associated with the Gulating in Gulen, you can see the majestic installations 'Tingveggen', 'Tinghella' and 'Eldsirkelen' made by artist Bård Breivik.

The park is open to the public, and guided tours are available for groups, all year. Lunch of **Viking 'tapas'** by arrangement (min. 15 persons). Visitors can join guided tours at set times during summer. Cultural trails have been created at both sites, where visitors can take their own guided tour using a mobile phone or iPad.

### Osterøy – a journey between fjord and mountains

Osterøy is an inland island, surrounded by beautiful fjords on all sides. This is the island for great nature and cultural experiences! Your bucket list should include a summit tour to Bruviknipa and a visit to Mjøsvågen where you will find the village shop **Mjøsvågen landhandleri**, **industrial** history and **Norlender**.

# Paradise for oceansport and deepsea fishing

In this region, you can have as much action-packed fun as you want. At **Kilstraumen Brygge**, experienced oceansport
enthusiasts ensure that everything takes
place in safe surroundings. How about
skindiving and snorkelling on the surface
of the sea, while you watch fish swim past
below? The joy of paddling a canoe on
calm freshwater lakes in **Nordhordland** is
a well-kept secret. Hire a canoe at **Bruvoll Camping** in Hundvin and explore them for
yourself!

#### Vaksdal

Vaksdal is situated between Bergen and Voss, and between the fjord and mountains. The Bergen Railway stops in Dale, which is the gateway to the fantastic hiking area Bergsdalen.

# WITH THE OCEAN TO THE WEST AND THE HARDANGEREJORD TO THE EAST

Tysnes is not just an island, but a group of islands, covering some 255 square kilometres.

Many people might associate the island of Tysnes with the festival **Tysnesfest**, a family-friendly music festival beside the sea. But Tysnes has a lot more to offer. The island is made up of areas of smooth coastal rock and heathland to the west, while the landscape shifts to high mountains and large areas of forest and the Hardangerfjord to the east. And not least, it has a **lovely archipelago** perfect for boating excursions with the option of fishing.

Tysnes has also gradually become known for **culinary experiences**. On the quay in Våge, you'll find **Mandelhuset** right beside the sea, where they make great food with authentic flavours, based on fresh, local produce. The restaurant gets fish and seafood from local fishermen on the quay, potatoes and beef from the neighbouring farm and fruit and apples are picked on the island.

When you're visiting Tysnes, you should put on your hiking boots and walk to the top of a mountain. **Tysnessåta** is in a lovely location in the middle of the island, and from the top, at an altitude of **751 metres**, you can enjoy great views of the Bjørnefjord, Myrdal, Os and Fusa. If you'd rather do an easier hike, **Ramnanuten** (230 metres) is recommended. The walk starts in Våge and is suitable for the whole family. There are magnificent views across Tysnesbygden and the Bjørnefjord from the top.

To get to Tysnes from Bergen, you take the ferry from Halhjem (where the ferry to Sandvikvåg on Stord also departs from), an approx. 35-40-minute drive from the centre of Bergen. The ferry goes to Våge.

The region west of Bergen offers a multitude of activities that make the most of the fascinating coastal landscape. Experience what it's like to catch a whopper in the great fishing grounds off **Sotra and Øygarden**, which are perfect for **deepsea fishing**. You can become one with the **archipelago** and the water in a sea kayak. Get a sense of the forces of nature and a rush as you ride the waves. There are daily boat departures to Cornelius from Bryggen in Bergen, and the trip takes 20 minutes. Enough time to whet your appetite ahead of your delicious meal.

Wild sheep graze on the islands along the ocean's edge. The coast has shaped both the land and people's lives for thousands of years along this exposed coast. Heather, sea salt and fresh sea air give Strilalammet lamb its delicious flavour, and this product is fast becoming a sought after-ingredient along the Bergen coast. However, great culinary experiences are not made of great ingredients alone. Enjoying a meal in the right environment enhances the experience. On fine days, the sliding doors are opened and light dishes are served on tables set on the quay. On rough days, we light candles in the lounges, light the fire and serve food with stronger flavours.

To see the best of Bergen, it's important to get around. Travel efficiently from A to B to get the most out of your stay.

The pride of Bergen's public transport, Bergen Light Rail, is a light rail service with two lines. Line 1 operates between Byparken in Bergen city centre and Bergen Airport Flesland while line 2 operates between Byparken and a suburb called Fyllingsdalen. Tickets can be purchased online, in the Skyss app and on the ticket machines at every light rail stop. Since Bergen Light Rail largely runs separate from other traffic, and has right of way at traffic lights, it is a more efficient form of transport than ordinary city trams. The many stops in central areas make Bergen Light Rail a popular means of transport for locals, tourists and visitors. There are good bus connections at many of the stops, such as Byparken and Lagunen, for those who wish to travel further by public transport.

Buses are perhaps the most flexible means of travelling on public transport in and around Bergen. The well-developed scheduled bus services bring you close to your destination in Bergen city centre, on Osterøy, Bergen North, Bergen South, Os, Hardanger, Voss and Austevoll. The main lines cover large areas of the Bergen Region, and the express buses transport passengers quickly to the bus terminals in the different districts. Tickets can be bought in kiosks or on an online/mobile phone app.

The Bergen Card enables you to travel free of charge on **Skyss's** bus and Bergen Light Rail services in Bergen and Hordaland.

As well as saving money and transporting you efficiently to destinations in the region, it can also provide a golden opportunity to see the areas around Bergen. With the Bergen Card in your pocket, you are free to go where you want, when you want. For free. You can, for example, take Bergen Light Rail to Troldhaugen and Fantoft Stave Church, or a bus to Old Bergen Museum or the Hardangerfjord.

If you want to make your own way around, the Bergen Card entitles you to a discount on **parking** at Bygarasjen multi-storey car park in the city centre. Useful information




